

# SCAMMING THE PATRIARCHY: A YOUTH SUMMIT

As part of the Department of Education and Public Engagement's ongoing programs engaging arts and social justice, the New Museum hosts its second annual youth summit and celebration. This year, the summit is organized by a luminary group of artists, writers, and activists committed to community building, including GHE20G0TH1K, Mask Magazine, the Sylvia Rivera Law Project, and Thank God For Abortion.

This year's program builds upon the principles of healing, self-love, skill building, political education, and empowerment established by the inaugural youth summit committee (BUFU, Brujas, Discwoman, and members of House of Ladosha). Emphasizing resilient visions for sustainability and thriving, and honoring the knowledge and resources of an intergenerational group of voices, the summit provides a space for dialogue rooted in oral histories and lived experience. Workshops focus on tangible skills and sustenance for creative, economic, and spiritual growth.

### **ORGANIZERS**

#### GHE20G0TH1K

GHE20G0TH1K, launched in 2009 as a local club night by DJ and Manhattan native Venus X, has since become a globally recognized institution hellbent on crushing fashion and music stereotypes. From the people that crowd its dance floor to the global spectrum of music that penetrates through its speakers to the irregular spelling of its name, nothing about GHE20G0TH1K (pronounced "Ghetto Gothic") is conformist. The party began as a space to funnel aggression through dark sonics and visceral dancing, in addition to altering the notion of goth as an exclusively Caucasian subculture. The manifestation of a physical space to communicate Venus and company's culled influences would prove key in establishing GHE20G0TH1K as a full-fledged brand, one synonymous with New York's thriving underground scene. Music has been and continues to be the party's biggest pull, but the experiential components derived from its bombastic energy have inspired creative feats in other disciplines as well. Now in its eighth year, GHE20G0TH1K's legacy continues, with a record label, a retail space, and regular show-cases all over the world. 
#### SYLVIA RIVERA LAW PROJECT

SRLP is a collective organization founded on the understanding that gender self-determination is inextricably intertwined with racial, social, and economic justice. Therefore, SRLP seeks to increase the political voice and visibility of low-income people and people of color who are transgender, intersex, or gender-nonconforming. SRLP works to improve access to respectful and affirming social, health, and legal services for our communities, and believes that in order to create meaningful political participation and leadership, we must have access to basic means of survival and safety from violence. srlp.org



#### THANK GOD FOR ABORTION

Thank God For Abortion is a project birthed by Viva Ruiz and friends. Their mission is to eliminate the criminalizing stigma around abortion one T-shirt, performance, or fanzine at a time. Thank God For Abortion occupies a light and apology-free space in a conversation that, even among the left, is fraught with guilt and secrecy. They are committed to repossessing narratives and pulling away from the dominant, extreme right-wing "sin" perspective that continues to justify legislating the torture and death of abortion-seeking people. Thank God For Abortion broadens the spectrum of this conversation by inhabiting a joyful and authentic place in regards to people's own experiences with abortion, and hopes to inspire others to do the same. **Black Gotham Experience is an immersive** visual storytelling project established in 2010 by artist and historian Kamau Ware that celebrates the impact of the African Diaspora on New York City since 1625. The Bowery (Bouwerij) is one of the oldest thoroughfares on the island of Manahatta and the area surrounding it tells the story of proto-feminism and racial dynamics in New **Amsterdam and British New York, From** the first Black woman landowner in 1643 to a 1741 rebellion hiding behind what's now known as Delancey Street, this fortyfive-minute storytelling journey will explore the parallels between systemic issues of gender and race yesterday and today.

#### HAVE FUN!

We invite you to have a good time and get to know each other.

# SET A LOVING INTENTION FOR YOUR TIME AT SCAMMING THE PATRIARCHY

How do you want to love yourself while you are present? In what ways do you want to grow? What do you want to be open to? How do you want to embody the love that is in you?

## RELEASE JUDGMENTS, PRECONCEIVED NOTIONS, YOUR EGO, AND YOUR FEARS

Lovingly challenge yourself to be open without attachment to outcomes. The goals that you set for yourself may or may not be met in the ways that you imagine. That is okay too. We are in an endless journey of learning and growing.

#### MOVE UP, MOVE UP

If you're someone who speaks a lot, please move up into a role of listening more. This is a twist on the more commonly heard "step up, step back." The "up/up" affirms that growth is happening in both experiences. (You don't go "back" by learning to be a better listener.)

#### SPEAK FROM YOUR OWN EXPERIENCE

Please try to speak from your own experience, not for an entire group of people.

#### PRIVILEGE & OPPRESSION ARE REAL

Be humbly, compassionately self-aware and curious about the ways privilege and oppression—across identity groups—impact us all. Recognize that your actions have an impact on others regardless of your intentions, and be accountable for your actions. As we share this space, we work against oppressing one another.

## BE AWARE OF THE LANGUAGE & BEHAVIOR YOU USE TO ADDRESS AND CONNECT WITH PEOPLE

Many words and actions have historically been used to oppress folks. Let's participate in ways that are liberatory and loving with each other.

#### CHECK YOUR RESPONSES, GAUGE YOUR REACTIONS

If something comes up during a discussion or activity that you find difficult, try sitting with that feeling to better gauge how you'd like to respond. Check in with yourself and others before sharing things that might potentially be triggering.

# HONOR PEOPLE'S PRONOUNS, GENDER IDENTITIES, AND PERSONAL IDENTITIES

Allow people to self-identify their gender, pronouns (e.g. he/him/his, she/her/hers, they/them/their, ze/hir/hirs), and personal identities to describe who they are. Do not assume anyone's gender identity, sexual preference, survivor status, economic status, background, ability, health, etc.

#### HONOR PEOPLE'S PRIVACY

Even if your intentions are well-meaning, please do not ask someone what their "old name" was or if they are trans, gender-nonconforming, or intersex. It is up to each individual to decide whether or not they want to offer up that kind of information.

#### NO ONE KNOWS EVERYTHING; TOGETHER WEKNOW A LOT

This means we all get to practice being humble, because we have something to learn from everyone in the room. It also means we all have a responsibility to share what we know, as well as our questions, so that others may learn from us.

#### WE CAN'T BE ARTICULATE ALL THE TIME

As much as we'd like to be articulate all the time, we just can't. Often, people feel hesitant to participate in a workshop or meeting for fear of "messing up" or stumbling over their words. We want everyone to feel comfortable participating, even if you can't be as articulate as you'd like.

#### RESPECT PHYSICAL BOUNDARIES & PERSONAL SPACE

Please do not touch people or their belongings without their consent.
