"WINDOW" SERIES CONTINUES AT THE NEW MUSEUM WITH INSTALLATIONS

BY RICHARD PRINCE AND BY CONTEMPORARY URBICULTURAL DOCUMENTATION,

SEPTEMBER 27 - DECEMBER 4, 1980

On September 27, THE NEW MUSEUM's 14th STREET SHOWCASE presents an installation by <u>Richard Prince</u>, the seventh in the ongoing "Window" series.

Richard Prince (September 27 - October 27) appropriates images from non-fictional sources (movies and magazines) and re-presents them (re-cropped and photographed) to the viewer. Because the images he has chosen are available to anyone prior to his appropriation, the "edge" of the original emotional message (desires and threats) is not lost. It is, in fact, because the viewer retains familiariarity with the original imagery that the fictional transformation is verified.

Researchers Hank Lewis and Orly Haddad of Contemporary

Urbicultural Documentation (Topical Archaeology) have organized

the next window project, to open on November 3. They examine

contemporary society by means of assembling, cataloging, and

ordering documents, objects, and artifacts retrieved from

recently active, non-residential sites. CUD deals not with

the architectural structures themselves, but with the activi
ties centered in them and the relationships generated by their

presence in the community.

"Window" installations are on display for approximately four weeks and are mounted either independently of or in conjunction with THE NEW MUSEUM's regularly scheduled exhibitions.
