


### DIRECTOR'S REPORT

This winter we were very pleased to welcome on staff our new Curator, William Olander, formerly Acting Director of the Allen Art Museum at Oberlin College, Ohio. Bill is well known and highly respected in the field, having organized many of the most innovative exhibitions of contemporary art in recent years. He will join Lynn Gumpert, Senior Curator, and Brian Wallis, Adjunct Curator, in planning approximately five major exhibitions and five smaller ON VIEW showings of new work each year.

We are also excited to have received a second grant from The Henry Luce Foundation's Fund for Scholarship in American Art, which will enable us to continue our Documentary Sources in Contemporary Art series. The first volume, Art After Modernism: Rethinking Representation, an anthology of critical writings, has just been published. The second volume, Artists' Writings: An Anthology, including fictional, journalistic, and uncon ventional narratives by contemporary artists, is scheduled for publication in September. Both books have been produced in conjunction with David R. Godine in Boston.

Our spring season promises to be a varied and busy one. In February we are presenting *Currents*, our ongoing series of simultaneous solo shows. This year's exhibition features over thirty narrative paintings by Baltimore artist John Hull and six large, lead and concrete sculptures by Mia Westerlund Roosen. *Signs*, opening in late April and organized by Ned Řifkin, traces the re-interpretation of literal signs or visual sign systems in

contemporary American art. In addition to our ON VIEW program, including the once-a-month performance by Linda Montano, the Education Department will sponsor its annual Children's Exhibition in June.

Finally, we are planning an elegant spring benefit, Celebration VI: The Magic of Pandora's Box.

We have invited artists from around the country to create a "box" for a Silent Auction.

We hope that you can attend and help to make our evening a success. We deeply appreciate your support as the Museum continues to grow and prosper.

#### OUTPOST OF PROGRESS: PAINTINGS BY JOHN HULL and MIA WESTERLUND ROOSEN: RECENT SCULPTURE

February 23–April 14 Members' preview, Friday, February 22, 8–10 p.m.

Currents, an ongoing series of simultaneous solo exhibitions, is designed to reveal a body of work by artists in mid-career. These smaller shows allow a variety of interesting work that is produced across the country to be seen indepth, accompanied by an expository essay and documentation.

Organized by Director Marcia Tucker and Senior Curator Lynn Gumpert, the 1985 *Currents* will present the work of John Hull and Mia Westerlund Roosen. Hull, a Baltimore artist and former newspaper reporter, has for many years created series of disturbing paintings with strong narrative content, whose themes revolve around the rituals of violence and death. Roosen's physically imposing, often monumental sculptures made of concrete with lead, encaustic or bronze convey an air of compelling mystery through contrasts. The massive, dense forms are awkward yet elegant, bulky yet graceful, static yet animated.

Friday, March 1, 12–6 p.m. The New Museum's Mercer Street Window (between Houston and Prince)


Internationally-renowned performance artist Linda Montano will occupy the Museum's rear window space one day a month for seven years. There spectators can join her for conversations and counseling on art and life. In this work, the artist intends to blur the distinctions between art and life by creating a mirror image of her private activities within the public space of the window.

Following the teachings of the Yoga Chakras, a system for locating centers of consciousness, Montano will use a different color each year—in 1985 it is red—to paint the window environment and clothe herself both at the Museum and at home.



### ON VIEW (3): SUSTAINED VISIONS

April 16-June 30

Periodically, part or all of the ON VIEW program will be devoted to a thematic exhibition in keeping with the Museum's policy to show recent work by lesser-known artists whose work merits exposure. In this instance, The New Work Gal-

lery will continue a series begun in 1979, entitled *Sustained Visions*, which will focus on the work of a mature artist who has maintained a consistent vision over an extended period of time. Organized by Guest Curator Dore Ashton, art historian and critic, the exhibition will feature approximately thirty drawings and five paintings by the French artist Tal-Coat. A brochure will accompany the showing. Installations in "The Window" and WorkSpace will also be on view.

### SIGNS

April 27–July 7 Members' preview, Friday, April 26, 8–10 p.m.

Signs constantly pervade our visual environment, inundating us with behavioral mandates. This large-scale exhibition will examine the work of ten American artists who take literal signs (i.e., road signs, advertisements, public announcements) or visual sign systems (as in sign language) and then remove them from their conventional associations. In such a way, they are able to inflect new meanings that may convey and embody more specifically personal information. Organized by Ned Rifkin, former Curator at The New Museum and currently Curator of Contemporary Art at the Corcoran Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C., the exhibition will include works by Gary Falk, Ken Feingold, Marian Galczenski, Jenny Holzer, John Knight, Matt Mullican, Tad Savinar, and Al Souza, among others.

quired since the Museum opened in 1977. The Semi-Permanent Collection is so called because the Museum changes its holdings every ten years to make room for more recent work. In this way, the collection can remain relevant to a museum devoted exclusively to contemporary art that reflects ideas and issues essential to the world in which we live. At the same time, the twenty-year span-the work must be completed within ten years of acquisition and held for the next decade-allows ample opportunity for reflection and scholarship. Organized by Director Marcia Tucker and Curators Lynn Gumpert and William Olander, the exhibition will also present a selection of promised gifts that indicates the diversity and direction of the Museum's present collecting activity.

#### **ART QUEST**

ART QUEST, the Museum's collectors' forum, brings together individuals who share a commitment to the world of contemporary art. Each month ART QUEST provides its members with the invaluable opportunity to speak informally with critics, curators, and artists in the homes of private collectors and in the studios of unaffiliated artists. In the past The New Museum has acquainted ART QUEST members with the work of Tom Butter, Keith Haring, James Hill, Judith Linhares, and Mark Tansey before any public showings.

A limited-edition print, available exclusively to ART QUEST members, is commissioned each year. This year's print was executed by Cheryl Laemmle, who first exhibited at the Museum in 1982.

ART QUEST comprises a separate category of membership and supports one exhibition annually. For more information about the program or the schedule of fall events, please contact Marcía Smith at the Museum.

### **EDUCATION ACTIVITIES**

Youth Program: The Museum continues to serve elementary schools in New York City. The twopart format combines an outreach program of classroom slide presentations with artist-led workshops held at the Museum.

Interns: Undergraduate and graduate students seeking an internship for course credit at the Museum should request an application form from the Education Department. Group Visits: School or adult groups who would like to schedule a visit to the Museum should also contact the Education Department. Docents will be available most days to provide informative gallery talks.

#### **ON VIEW**

This winter, the Museum inaugurated a tripartite series of exhibitions under the title, ON VIEW. The New Work Gallery was constructed on the main exhibition floor to feature continuously work by artists who have not received significant exposure in New York City. WorkSpace, the gallery located on the second level, will be used for both site-specific installations and smaller exhibitions. "The Window," visible from Broadway, will continue to be used as an installation space that willfully engages the general public. All three formats will remain "on view" for approximately eight weeks and will be accompanied by a handout with a brief essay and documentation. #### **BOOKS DOCUMENTARY SOURCES** IN CONTEMPORARY ART

The Museum has been awarded a grant by The Henry Luce Foundation's Fund for Scholarship in American Art to publish an anthology of artists' writings. This book, the second volume in the Documentary Sources in Contemporary Art series, will be a companion to an anthology of recent criticism, also supported by the Luce Fund. Both books, directed by Series Editor Marcia Tucker and compiled by Editor Brian Wallis, present original material by critics (volume one) and artists (volume two) in order to promote discussion of issues essential to the understanding of recent experimental art.

**Art After Modernism: Rethinking Representation** 

with a cover designed by Barbara Kruger, contains twenty-five essays by contemporary writers of art and cultural criticism. The book focuses on the critique of representation, a central issue of much of today's art. Individual essays will examine the influence of the media, the eclipse of modernism, the shifting roles of artist and audience, and the important notions of artistic originality and cultural context. The book, co-published by The New Museum and David R. Godine of Boston, is now available through the Museum Shop or by mail order (see Publications page).

Artists' Writings: An Anthology will bring together for the first time a collection of critical, journalistic, and fictional writings of the past decade from widely

diverse sources. The anthology will provide new forms of writings by artists-not only about art and artmaking, but about new genres, hybrid forms of image and text, and unconventional narratives. Publication date is tentatively set for Fall

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
