



LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

This fall we are continuing our series of important mid-career surveys with Tom Friedman, the wonderfully inventive sculptor who creates mind-bending objects with everyday materials and obsessive attention to detail. Concurrently, we will feature projects by two emerging artists: *A PORTRAIT OF THE LOST BOYS <<in five parts deftly and six details of straining>>* by New Zealander Jacqueline Fraser and *Dig* by New Yorker Jason Middlebrook. New acquisitions by other up-and-coming artists will be featured in *A Work in Progress: Selections from the New Museum Collection*. This is only the second presentation of the Collection in the Museum's history, and the first selected by New Museum Senior Curator Dan Cameron. The exhibition will reveal some of the Museum's little known holdings and provide an occasion to announce new guidelines as we take more active acquisition initiatives. Our ongoing collaboration with Altoids, which was recognized by an Arts and Business Council Partnership Award this past June, is one example of the new partnerships that are helping to reshape our collecting policy.

On July 6th, the *Paul McCarthy* exhibition opened at the Villa Arson in Nice, marking the first time that a New Museum exhibition has toured to a European venue. *Paul McCarthy* remains on view at the Villa Arson through 23.sep.01 and then continues on to the TATE Liverpool, UK 18.oct.01-13.jan.02. In addition, *William Kentridge* will open at the Museum of Contemporary Art, Chicago 20.oct.01. Also this fall, William Kentridge will direct *Zeno at 4am* for Lincoln Center's *New Visions* series. We are very pleased to have collaborated with several institutions this year—with the MCA Chicago to organize the Kentridge exhibition, with the Public Art Fund to present Paul McCarthy's *The Box*, and with the Wexner Center for the Arts and the Kölnischer Kunstverein in Germany to produce *Hélio Oiticica: Quasi-cinemas* in 2002.


This year, new education initiatives include regular on-line forums for most exhibitions available both in the galleries and on our web site as well as the formation of a new Youth Council. The Youth Council will offer underserved high school students the unique opportunity to experience diverse perspectives on contemporary art, and to gain professional skills by working at the New Museum. This is in addition to a wide variety of public programs and Digital Culture Evenings in the Media Z Lounge. I hope you will take advantage of these wonderful programs as well as the special events we have planned for members this season at the New Museum of Contemporary Art.

A WORK IN PROGRESS SELECTIONS FROM THE NEW MUSEUM COLLECTION


Christian Boltanski, Mona Hatoum, Cildo Meireles, Andres Serrano, Nancy Spero and David Wojnarowicz all had their first surveys at the New Museum of Contemporary Art. *A Work in Progress* includes works by these artists and more than 40 others spanning the mid-1970s to the present. Organized by Senior Curator Dan Cameron, the exhibition touches on many of the key developments in contemporary art over the last 30 years and marks a renewed emphasis on building the Museum's collection.

Conceptual art, performance, photography, painting, political art, new media and installation are all incorporated in *A Work in Progress*. At the core of this selection are many recently acquired new works from the Altoids Curiously Strong Collection by young artists such as Laylah Ali, Jessica Craig-Martin, Sue de Beer, Sam Durant, Eve Fowler, Mark Lombardi, and Fatimah Tuggar. A historical context for this selection is provided through the inclusion of key pieces from the 1970s and 1980s by ACT UP (Gran Fury), Robert Colescott, Felix Gonzalez-Torres, Hans Haacke, Ann Hamilton, Tehching Hsieh, Komar & Melamid, Louise Lawler, Sherrie Levine, Cildo Meireles, Bruce Nauman, Andres Serrano, Hiroshi Sugimoto, Camilo Jose Vergara, Krysztof Wodiczko and David Wojnarowicz.



Since the founding of the New Museum in 1977, the Museum's collecting practices have developed along largely investigative lines. As early as 1978, the Museum openly questioned how a permanent collection could remain fresh and relevant, leading to the formation of a "semi-permanent" collection. The semi-permanent policy stipulated that works of art should be deaccessioned and returned to circulation after ten to twenty years. Proceeds from the sales would to be used to purchase new works. Up until 1996, many of the works acquired by the New Museum were sold, exchanged or traded. *A Work in Progress* marks an assessment of the New Museum's collecting policy and coincides with the formulation of a new set of guidelines.

A Work in Progress is supported in part by the Producers Council of the New Museum of Contemporary Art, and by Patron level and New Group members.

TOM FRIEDMAN

Tom Friedman's hypnotically labor intensive sculptures, works on paper, photographs and site-specific installations are the subject of his first museum survey exhibition. Often taking the art of process to absurd extremes, Friedman uses everyday materials such as sugar cubes, chewing gum, aspirin, and spaghetti to make extraordinary objects.

Thirty-five works by Friedman, with influences ranging from pop art and minimalism to process art and conceptualism are presented in the exhibition at the New Museum. The installation, designed by Friedman himself, includes early works such as *Untitled* (1989), in which the artist applied layers of toothpaste to the wall to create an "abstract" painting, and *Hot Balls* (1992), a meticulous arrangement of 200 bouncy balls all stolen by the artist over a six-month period. For *1000 Hours of Staring* (1992-1997), the artist stared at a blank piece of paper over a five-year period and for *Everything* (1992-1995) he wrote all of the words in the English language on a large sheet of paper. In his most recent work, *Untitled* (2000), Friedman created a gruesome, life-sized self portrait as if just after a motorcycle wreck, entirely from construction paper.

Friedman's modest and humorous works rekindle a sense of childlike wonder at even the most familiar objects and, in so doing, remind us of art's remarkable power to transform and transcend.

Tom Friedman was organized by the Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art, Winston-Salem, North Carolina. Funding for this exhibition is provided by The Lannan Foundation, the Elizabeth Firestone Graham Foundation, and Art for Art's Sake.


A PORTRAIT OF THE LOST BOYS <</i>
For her first New York exhibition, Jacqueline Fraser creates a labyrinthine site-specific installation of eleven life-size female wire figures draped in sumptuous pink, black and brown fabrics alongside the heads of young boys, also sculpted in wire. The beauty and fragility of the materials contrast sharply with the harsh subject matter of the work. Through the story of the premature death of a local New Zealand boy, accompanying texts address the disenfranchisement of youth in society today. Fraser recently represented New Zealand in the 2001 Venice Biennale. A PORTRAIT OF THE LOST BOYS is organized by Anne Barlow.

DIG Using artificial materials to build fake layers of earth, stones, plants, roots, and wild ground cover, New Yorker Jason Middlebrook has created *Dig*, a site-specific project designed for the ledge above the New Museum Store. The installation mimics an excavation site as if a hole were cut directly through the floor of the Museum revealing the ground beneath. *Dig* continues the artist's exploration of the division between nature and culture and brings to life the physical and geologic history lying below the steel and concrete of New York City. *Dig* is organized by William Stover.

CLOACA Built from an astonishing array of laboratory glassware, electric pumps, computer monitors, and plastic tubing, *Cloaca* is an elaborate installation conceived by Belgian artist Wim Delvoye to duplicate as closely as possible the functions of the human digestive system. Designed and built in collaboration with scientists at the University of Antwerp, *Cloaca* is "fed" a variety of nutritious meals twice daily. It then chews, swallows, digests, and eliminates.

The summation of many of the ideas that have informed Delvoye's art flirting with prosaic and vulgar materials, and juxtaposing irreconcilable elements in witty and surprising ways—*Cloaca* is the most significant work yet made by this leading member of a new generation of European artists. Although certainly entertaining, the installation touches on significant issues such as the impact of biotechnology on cultural production.

Wim Delvoye: *Cloaca* was organized by the Museum voor Hedendaagse Kunst, Antwerp and is accompanied by an extensive English-language catalogue published by Ludion.



Cin-o-matic: Memory and Cinematic Perception explores the impact of new media on the moving image. The exhibition includes the artist collaborative project *Adrift* (Helen Thorington, Marek Walczak, and Jesse Gilbert with Martin Wattenberg and Hal Eager), and works by Willy Le Maitre and Eric Rosenzveig, Yucef Merhi, Joseph Nechvatal, and John Cabral. Each of the projects uses the Internet as a tool to reconfigure live and pre-recorded sound and images into network performance, net art, software-propelled visualizations, or sculptural objects that expand the traditional cinematic experience. Agenda for a Landscape This interactive exhibition investigates the collisions of history, humanity, and technology in the 1997 Mars Pathfinder mission by imagining the Sojourner rover as a free intelligent agent with semi-autonomous control. Agenda for a Landscape posits a scenario in which web-site users break through NASA security walls, communicate with the Sojourner rover, conduct experiments, and beam their findings back to the Media Z Lounge. 


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JOSÉ ANTONIO HERNÁNDEZ-DIEZ 17.MAY.02-11.AUG.02






