

New Museum Announces Triennial Artists

The New Museum in New York has just announced the list of artists included in its second Generational Triennial of emerging artists, scheduled to run Feb. 15-Apr. 22. Titled "The Ungovernables," this iteration is curated by Eungie Joo, curator and director of education and public programs at the museum. It will feature 34 artists and collectives from some 20 countries, with all participants born between 1973 and 1984.

The first triennial, "Younger than Jesus," featured 50 artists born after 1976, the titular qualification being the only unifying theme. For "The Ungovernables," Joo has selected artists whose works express "the urgencies of a generation who came of age after the independence and revolutionary movements of the 1960s and '70s," according to the press release. The show borrows its title from the term co-opted by the African National Congress, South Africa's ruling party, in 1986, transforming its use from one of denigration to organized defiance.
